2021 Brincat IASA Summer Camp




Though the masks made it clear that we were not yet done with COVID-19, it was as if the pandemic was but a distant memory in every other way.

On Sunday, June 27th, 85 boys and girls from all over the country concluded the 8th grade school year by spending a week at IASA's Brincat Summer Camp. The best and brightest of their schools and communities, they came from a diverse mix of regions and backgrounds, from the Galilee to the Negev (see Table 1 below), including religious and secular, Jews and Arabs. A student with special-needs was also among the participants.

Brincat Camp offers four educational streams: Music, Art, Science and Humanities, providing campers the opportunity delve deeply into their field of interest - for some, this is their first high-level, hands-on experience that are unique to IASA's programs.

As in previous years, camp faculty was made up of IASA's renowned teaching staff alongside teachers from the Excellence Educators Institute that operates IASA's nationwide STEM teacher training programs. The opportunity for these bright young people to learn from educators who are also professionals in their fields is one of the major draws to the Brincat camp, attracting students from all over Israel.



Day one kicked-off with campers arriving at 10am. They were introduced to Brincat Camp's Director, Ofer Zaguri and staff. Following, was an open session for students and staff to meet and mingle freely.

Campers then separated by discipline for the afternoon, exploring new ways to "learn". After reuniting for dinner, a special teambuilding activity was held in IASA's gym. Students had to collaborate on complex challenges that could only be solved through coordination and teamwork.





Day two was fully dedicated to working within disciplines:

- **Music** students studied with composer and IASA-HS Music Department Head, Yisrael Sharon, taking part in classes on performance, theory, ear training/hearing development, music history, and composition.
- Art students were given access to IASA's studio workshops, where they had the opportunity explore a wide variety of media, from brush-and-ink to



lithography and block-printing to sculpture and multimedia. In addition to specialized printing, drawing and sculpture workshops, students learned and researched various topics related to the history of art.







• Science students alternated between Computer Science (part of an emerging new major at IASA) and Geo-Chemistry. Here, students learned about the elements that make up the earth, how the seas and continents were formed from them, and how they continue to change even today. The learning took place through experiments in our laboratory where they studied the composition of rocks and soils, and learned about the processes that led to their creation. Computer Science classes were designed to introduce students to C # programming. Students were taught



C # programming. Students were taught the basic tools of the language and reached a higher level allowing them to create and program a game, including creating graphic applications.

Humanities students took part in classes in history, literature, and culture.
The wide variety of texts used were all related to fantasy literature; beyond
discussing these, students were assisted in producing an actual booklet
created from their own writings (from critical analysis to fiction) in the genre.
(At the close of the camp, all participants received a copy to take home and
enjoy.)



Days three and four were again centered around work within disciplines until midafternoon, after which campers were taken on field trips: first to Jerusalem's Biblical Zoo and Israel Museum on Tuesday and the botanical gardens and water park in Tel Aviv's Ganei Yehoshua Park on Wednesday.









Upon returning to IASA's campus, students headed to dinner both nights, followed by social activities in the evenings.

Day five featured a final full day with students working within their individual disciplines. Each track concluded with the production of a final booklet showcasing aspects of their work over the week. For two of the tracks, these were integrated into wider visibility events, while the Music students concluded their week with a final recital, Art students arranged their linotype, sculpture and lithographic works as part of a group exhibition, which all students helped organize. The exhibition was followed by a group photo session and later in the evening, the camp's organizers surprised the campers with a party, replete with giant inflatables—giving them several hours to just relax and have fun participating in an event that lasted



through the evening. Brincat Camp ended on Friday, July 2nd with a farewell event in the morning, allowing kids to say goodbye to one another, after which they packed up, and headed for home.
